The Database serves to increase the visibility of successful prosecutions, identify global patterns, and promote the realities of this devastating crime.

The Database sheds light on the many questions which surround the crime of trafficking in persons, and the answers to which are key in developing appropriate and targeted responses to this global crime.

As of January 2015, the Database includes over 1,100 cases from 90 countries.
